Guest speakers at the EPWS Annual Conference

The first EPWS Annual Conference “Women Shaping Science” will host prestigious speakers from all over Europe: scientists, politicians, and science decision-makers.

Prof. Habil. Dr. Kazimiera D. Prunskienė, Patroness of the conference, Minister and Member of the Lithuanian Parliament was the first Prime Minister of Lithuania after the country’s Independence in 1990. **Roma Žakaitienė** is the current Lithuanian Minister of Education and Science.

The European Commission will be represented by **Florence Bouvret**, Scientific Officer in the Directorate General Research, Unit Scientific Culture and Gender Issues.

Prof. Benediktas Juodka, Rector of Vilnius University, is internationally known as scientist and university leader.

Prof. Dr. Ene Ergma, Astrophysicist and Former Vice President of the Estonian Academy of Sciences, is the Speaker of the Estonian Parliament. She is also Former President of ENWISE (Enlarging Women in Science to East), the Expert Group on Women Scientists in the Central and Eastern European Countries and in the Baltic States, who delivered the report “Waste of Talents: Turning Private Struggles into Public Issue. Women and Science in the ENWISE Countries” in 2004.

Prof. Dr. Ada Yonath, internationally reknown crystallographer from the Structural Biology Department at the Weizmann Institute of Science in Rehovot (Israel) is the 2008 European L’Oréal-UNESCO Laureate For Women in Science - Life Sciences.

Dr. Alina Ligia Dumitrescu is a Senior Researcher at the Institute of World Economy of the Romanian Academy and specialised in European Integration, Economies in Transition, Macroeconomics, European Social Policy, Socio-Economic Research, Management of Non-Governmental Organisations, Social Work with Discriminated Groups (Minorities and Women).

Prof. Dr. Marja Makarow, Chief Executive of the European Science Foundation, is Professor of Biochemistry and Molecular Biology and former Vice-Rector for Research of the University of Helsinki. She has worked for several national and intergovernmental research funding and research performing organisations in Europe. She is a member of the National Advisory Council for Science and Technology Policy in Finland reporting to the Ministries and Parliament.

First steps to establish EIT

In February 2008, the European Commissioner for Education and Culture, Ján Figel, announced the members of the Identification Committee – the committee charged with recommending members for the Governing Board of the European Institute of Innovation and Technology (EIT).

The members of the Identification Committee are: Professor Günter Stock, Chairman, President of the Berlin-Brandenburg Academy of Sciences and Humanities; Professor Miklos Boda, Advisor to the Rector at the Budapest University of Technology and Economics; Cecilia Schelin Seidegård, Chairwoman of the Royal University of Technology in Stockholm; and Professor Ronan Stéphan, Director for Industrial Affairs and Technology Transfer of the French CNRS, and Executive Director of France Innovation Scientifique et Transfert SA.

The Identification Committee started work in February 2008 and is expected to complete its deliberations in July 2008. The Governing Board will have 18 members.

The Governing Board, which will steer the activities of the EIT, will be composed of independent members who provide a balance of expertise in business, research and education. It will set the strategy of the EIT and decide on the areas in which to invest and to establish the Knowledge and Innovation Communities (KICs). It will also be responsible for the selection of the communities, and for the monitoring and evaluating their work.

Furthermore, on 11 March 2008, the European Parliament adopted the regulation which gives

way to the establishment of the EIT after two years of discussions in Brussels on the structure, financing and even the name of the new body.

The main aim of the EIT is to help boosting Europe's investment in technology and innovation and its capacity to attract the world's leading researchers and scientists, as well as promote a link between academia and the private sector.

Instead of a new institute similar to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in the US – as originally considered by the Commission – the EU has opted for a two-tier structure, a Governing Board and numerous research communities in various countries (KICs).

Every KIC would consist of at least three partner organisations, situated in at least two different member states and including at least one higher education institution and one private company.

While not awarding academic degrees itself, the institute will encourage universities taking part in projects financed by it to add an EIT label to the degrees and diplomas they award. Once the EIT is established, the first KICs on climate change, renewable energy and next-generation information and communication technologies are expected to be established within eighteen months. If the EIT is operational in summer 2008, the first KICs could be established by 2010.

Fifth Freedom for EU Scientists

On the occasion of the EU Spring Summit, the EU leaders gathered in Brussels on 13-14 March 2008 agreed to step up efforts to improve working conditions for researchers and increase knowledge transfer between universities and business as a way to reverse the "brain drain" of European talent.

The politicians highlighted the "free movement of knowledge" as a priority to respond to the challenges of globalisation and transform the

EU into "a truly modern and competitive economy".

According to the Conclusions of the Summit, this "fifth freedom" should be created by removing barriers to the cross-border mobility of researchers, students, scientists and academic staff and by providing researchers with "better career structures" including family-friendly career paths.

The 4 traditional freedoms in the European Union, as stated in its Treaty, are the free circulation of goods, capitals, people and services.

Report on Women in Research Decision Making

The Expert Group on Women in Research Decision Making (WIRDEM) delivered its report on 3 March 2008.

Created by the European Commission in 2007, the Expert Group's objective was to identify and review positive actions and gender equality measures at institutional and national level, in view of promoting women into senior positions in public research.

The report of the WIRDEM Expert Group examines and describes in detail nomination procedures, obstacles, facts and funding limitations that women need to overcome in their academic careers. It reviews the procedures for evaluating and promoting research personnel to senior positions and identifies examples of good practice at national and institutional levels.

Based on this analysis, the report proposes recommendations to facilitate the design of a framework for better targeted actions at European level, and highlights the problem of poor awareness and visibility.

Monitoring gender equality in FP6

The European Commission published a study "Monitoring gender equality in the 6th Framework Programme" on 18 March 2008. The study covers all RTD areas including nanotechnology, nanoscience, new industrial materials and production processes (Priority 3 in FP6) and looks at the performance of European funded research from the twofold perspective of women participation in research (research by women) and the integration of gender relevant issues in research content (research for women).

Marja Makarow, new Chief Executive of the ESF

On 1 January 2008, Marja Makarow took over as Chief Executive of the European Science Foundation (ESF), the first woman to lead the organisation since its foundation over 30 years ago.

A biochemist by training, Professor Makarow did her PhD in Helsinki. She then moved to the European Molecular Biology Laboratory (EMBL) in Heidelberg (Germany) to carry out her post doctoral research.

Professor Makarow first became involved in the policy-making arena ten years ago, when she was nominated as a member of the Academy of Finland's Research Council for Health. Her most important posts include membership of the Finnish delegation to the EMBL and the

European Molecular Biology Conference (EMBC). Other organisations which have benefited from her expertise include Science Foundation Ireland, the Austrian Ministry for Science and Research and Research Foundation Flanders.

She is also a member of Finland's National Council for Science and Technology Policy, which is chaired by the Prime Minister and reports to the government.

Established in 1974, the European Science Foundation (ESF) is an association of 77 member organisations devoted to scientific research in 30 European countries.

Code of Conduct for Responsible Nanosciences and Nanotechnologies Research

The European Commission adopted the Code of Conduct for Responsible Nanosciences and Nanotechnologies Research on 8 February 2008.

The reasons behind the adoption of this Code of Conduct are that knowledge gaps remain about the impact of these technologies on human health and the environment, and that issues relating to ethics and the respect of fundamental rights are involved.

Based on 7 general principles, the Code of Conduct invites Member States to take concrete action, involving universities, research institutes and companies, for the safe development and use of nanotechnologies.

The 7 general principles are: *Meaning, Sustainability, Precaution, Inclusiveness, Excellence, Innovation and Accountability.*

This Code of Conduct is based on a consultation that the Commission had launched in July 2007.

New statistics on women employed in science and technology

Eurostat, the Statistical Office of the European Communities, published new statistics on women employed in science and technology on 7 February 2008.

According to this report, in 2006 the human resources in science and technology (HRST) aged 25-64 employed in the EU totaled 75.7 million. Out of the number of employed HRST with tertiary education (HRSTE), 48% were female. In terms of occupation (HRSTO) the share of females was near parity at 51%. However, women appear to be more successful at finding a job that matches their qualifications, as 48% of all employed female HRST had completed tertiary education and were employed as professionals or technicians (HRSTC), against 43% for men.

Recruitment of the Director of the European Institute for Gender Equality

On 14 March 2008, the European Commission (EC) made the second vacancy notice for the post of Director of the European Institute for Gender Equality to be based in Vilnius.

This is the second attempt to elect a Director for the Institute, as the first screening resulted in no suitable candidates out of 70.

The term of the mandate is 5 years. The Director is responsible for the daily management of the Institute and the implementation of the work programme. He/she is in charge of the recruitment of staff and, under the supervision of the Management Board, is responsible for:

- ✓ Performance of the tasks of the Institute;
- ✓ Preparing and implementing the annual and medium-term work programmes;
- ✓ Preparing the meetings of the Management Board and the Experts' Forum;

- ✓ Preparing and publishing the annual report;
- ✓ Staff-related and day-to-day administration matters;
- ✓ Monitoring and evaluating the performance of the Institute against its objectives

First FEBS/EMBO Women in Science award

The Israeli systems biologist Naama Barkai has been named as the first ever winner of the FEBS/EMBO Women in Science award, which the Federation of European Biochemical Societies and European Molecular Biology Organisation launched in 2007.

The award, which will be handed out annually, recognises the exceptional achievements of a female life sciences researcher over the previous five years and whose work will inspire future generations of women in science.

Professor Barkai, who is based at the Weizmann Institute of Science in Rehovot, Israel, won the award for her outstanding contributions to the field of systems biology and the mathematical modelling of biological systems.
